

Interlude between the sixth and seventh trumpets Revelation 10:1 – 11:14

- **Chapter 10:1-11:14** gives us a break from the seven trumpet judgements.
- We have already looked at 6 trumpets in **Revelation 8** & 9)
- We will see the contents of Trumpet 7 beginning in 11:15.
- In chapter 10:1-11:15, we will be given the answer to the question
- "Why does God send His wrath upon lost mankind at His second coming?"

People's understanding of Revelation throughout the history of the Church:

a. The early Church in the 1st & 2nd centuries viewed Revelation as **predictive prophecy**.

- b. Then there was the period of <u>allegorical</u> <u>interpretations</u>.
- c. Followed by the **<u>symbolic treatment</u>** of John's Revelation. .
- d. Now we are on the other end of the scale.

OVERVIEW

- John is told that history's predicted end will unfold Rev
 10:1–7.
- Is John is handed a scroll and asked to prophecy Rev 10:8-11.

THE BEGINNING OF THE END – Revelation 10:1-11

- ☞ Who is this angel? Probably Jesus! Why?
 - A description of this mighty angel is <u>symbolic of who</u> <u>Christ is</u>:
 - 1. His deity, His faithfulness, and His justice.
 - 2. Christ's feet are planted firmly on the sea and earth, <u>symbolising His sovereignty</u>, <u>His ownership</u> and <u>His</u> <u>control</u> over all creation.

A MIGHTY ANGEL APPEARS WITH A SMALL SCROLL

v:1-4. 1. This angel is "descending from Heaven." "draped in a cloud."

- This angel is coming to declare judgement on the earth.
- Angelic beings clothed in a cloud are <u>rare in</u> <u>apocalyptic literature</u>.
- Cloud <u>Glory</u> (Cloudy pillar! during the day)
- A cloud is often associated with **the glory of God**.

- 2. This mighty angel has a "rainbow above his head."
 - Rainbow (Mercy) (Rainbow after flood)
 - Ezek 1:28. Revelation 4:3 alluded to Ezekiel's vision.
 - The rainbow carries <u>the symbolism of God's</u> <u>covenant</u>.
 - God's judgement is about to be unleashed <u>in keeping</u> <u>with God's covenant</u> that he made with his people.
 - Similar description of the Son of Man in **Revelation 1:15-16**.
- 3. This mighty angel's face is "like the sun."
 - Sun Divinity, glory (Mt. of Transfiguration.)
- 4. Legs of fire <u>Judgement</u>! (No winking at sin! anymore)
 - This Mighty angel <u>walked</u> here, <u>lived</u> here, <u>died</u> here, <u>Rose again</u> here, <u>ascended to heaven</u> from here.
 - He has watched this world <u>persecute His saints</u>, <u>devastate His world</u>, and <u>turn a deaf ear to His</u> <u>consistent calls</u>.
 - But, He is coming back! No meek, <u>mister nice guv</u> this time. He comes in wrath!

Why would He swear by Himself?

- a. Because there is no one greater than Himself... He is God!
- b. He is swearing that time is running out, referring to His imminent coming & eternal kingdom.
- c. This Kingdom will no longer be limited by time as we know it.

This same Christ is seen holding a "little scroll"

- a. This reveals that the contents of this "little scroll" is ultimately **under His control alone**.
- b. The contents of this scroll are revealed in **Revelation 11:1-14**
- c. This little scroll is "open", helping us to see that its message is ready to be received by John
- d. Unlike the seven sealed scroll whose contents will not be revealed to John until all seven seals are opened.

John hears the voices of seven thunders

- a. These are the announcements of the coming <u>7 bowl</u> judgements.
- b. God's merciful restriction of evil, and a loving hindrance of judgement, will end **Revelation 10:5-7.**
- <u>c. This is the only picture we have in the book of Revelation of</u> <u>information that remains sealed</u>

John is given a Four-fold responsibility:

- 1. To <u>receive the message</u> of the little scroll
- 2. To eat it, and digest it. (Obvious analogy to Ezekiel 3)
- 3. To be completely familiar with it and the understanding of it.
- 4. Finally, John was to share this message with his readers by recording it as a part of this Revelation.
 - John is told that once he received this message:
 - It would make his "<u>belly bitter</u>" although it would be "<u>sweet as honey</u>" in his mouth. (Sweet & sour)

Two basic contents of this scroll:

- a. A message that includes:
 - 🖙 God's grace, mercy, love, salvation and blessings,
 - Pleasing to those who read it.
 - It also includes:
- b. A message about:
 - Sin, God's wrath, spiritual darkness, and the abuse of God's people,
 - All this is bitter in the stomach of those who serve Christ.

Chapter 11, reveals the contents of this little scroll.

- ✓ Two <u>courageous</u> <u>witnesses</u> dressed in sackcloth testify against mankind for a period of time predicted in Daniel **Rev 11:1–6.**
 - a. Measuring the Temple of God **Rev 11:1–2.** Rejection of genuine worship of God
 - b. Do the people of God measure up? (2 Kings 21; Zech 2; Rev 21)
- ✓ The witnesses are killed, raised again to life and taken away into heaven Rev 11:7–14.
 - b. Ministry of the Witnesses- **11:3-13.**
 - They are mourning for the sins of the nation of Israel,
 - and for the sins of all God's people,
 - Rejection of the messengers of God

- c. Preparation for the 7th Trumpet **11:14.** (The Third Woe)
- \checkmark There is rejoicing for God has begun to reign ${\bf Rev}$

11:15–19.

- d. The Seventh Trumpet 11:15–19.
 - The completion of God's wrath at His second coming
 - (detailed in Rev 16:)

"The Mystery of God would ultimately be revealed and fulfilled one day"

Take away:

- a. We are presently living in the last of the last days.
- b. Let us <u>pray</u>, <u>study</u> and <u>witness</u> so that we may live and work for Jesus until He comes.
- c. Are you ready to meet God?
